Be it known that I John Barkshire of the County of Boone and state of Kentucky do hereby relinquish and make void all my right title claim and interest which I shall by virtue of a Bill of sale dated the fifteenth day of March 1827. for a negro man named Saml. to Claiborn Allen John Case two of the Commissioners appointed by the Boone Circuit Court at the November Term 1827 to take Charge of Dickey Barkshire and his Estate and do hereby acknowledge that I never paid One Cent in Consideration of said negro aforesaid named Bill of sale in Witness whereof I hereunto set my hand this sixteenth day of Nov: 1827.

Whereas an article of agreement was made and entered into on the 17<sup>th</sup> day of May 1827 between John Barkshire of the County of Boone and state of Kentucky of the One part, and Larkin Ryle of the Other part relative to the purchase and sale of a negro man named Samuel by said Larkin Ryle of the said John Barkshire for the purposes and upon the conditions set forth in said agreement which on the said 17<sup>th</sup> day of May 1827 was duly recorded in the Clerk's Office of the County Court of Boone County reference thereto being had the terms conditions and stipulations will more fully appear. And when as both the said Barkshire and the said Ryle are anxious to cancel annul and make void the said Article of agreement so as aforesaid made entered into and recorded, Wherefore I know all men by these presents that we John Barkshire and Larkin Ryle for a valuable consideration passing between us and for divers Other reasons and Considerations do hereby cancel annul and make void to all and every purpose whatever the aforesaid Article of agreement and do further forever acquit and discharge each Other from each and every Obligation Covenant or promise in said Article of agreement contained and from all and

every action or right of action that might or could be any possibly accrued to us or either of us by or on account of the Article of agreement or to any Other person or persons whatever. In witness whereof we hereunto set Our hands and seals this 14<sup>th</sup> day of Nov: 1827.

(This) deed made and entered into this 9<sup>th</sup> day of March 1829 between John Ryle of the One part and John Bredlow of the Other part both of the County of Boone and state of Kentucky, Whereunto that the said Ryle for and in Consideration of the sum of eighty two dollars in hand paid and secured to be paid the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged hath and by these presents doth grant bargain sell alien convey and confirm unto the said John Bredlow and heirs his heirs and assigns forever a certain tract or parcel of land lying and being in said County of Boone and on Westpoints Creek and adjoining the lands of said Bredlow which he purchased of John Morris which tract hereby sold and conveyed is bounded as follows To wit Beginning at a beech a corner of Lot Ingram's thence thence with Ingram's line crossing Westpoints Creek to a sugar stump in S. Ingram's line just above the mouth of Morrell's and Morris Spring branch then down Westpoints Creek with its meanders to an elm a little below Acus corner thence a North Easterly direction and up a branch to a red Oak in S. Ingram's line thence with his line to the beginning which includes a school house. To have and to hold the above described tract of land to the same more or less together with all and singular the appen-
